




Globally coherent, regionally relevant – what does this mean for marine litter?

UNEA Resolutions Marine Litter and Microplastics (1/6, 2/11, 3/7)

- → Requested UNEP to **support development of marine litter action plans** upon request by countries (all resolutions)
- → 1/6: State of knowledge: Marine plastic debris and microplastics (2016 report → UNEA-2)
 - → Priority areas for action
 - → Research gaps
 - → Policy relevant recommendations
- → 2/11: Requested assessment of the effectiveness of relevant international, regional and sub-regional governance strategies and approaches to combat marine plastic litter and microplastics and identify gaps and options for addressing them (→ UNEA-3)
- → Called for greater collaboration and coordination through/with the Global Partnership on Marine Litter (all resolutions)


Enhanced coordination and governance
